Start with oldest materials as this is likely to have been 'forgotten' and you will need to refresh your memory and revisit this work first. Then work your way through to the most recent material.</p> <p>Use a variety of different revision techniques – start with the content that encourages 'Active Learning' – you need to be doing something more than just reading over notes so develop mind maps and revision mats, then develop flash cards to cover key terms, theories and processes, case studies.</p> <p>Use past papers to plan potential answer especially for 'Assess' and 'Evaluate' questions – start with detailed plans at first then work on developing your skill for mini plans as shown in lessons</p>

There are four sections within the paper that are each worth 24 marks. You should aim to spend 30 minutes on each section.</p> <p>There will be a variety of multiple choice, short answer, and extended writing questions in this paper. The extended writing question(s) will be worth a maximum of 16 marks per question. There is no fixed number of extended writing questions in a paper.</p> <p><b><u>Paper 2 – Psychology in context</u></b></p> <p>There are two sections within this paper, which are worth 24 marks. You should aim to spend 30 minutes on sections A and B.</p> <p>There will be a variety of multiple choice, short answer, and extended writing questions in this paper. The extended writing question(s) will be worth a maximum of 16 marks per question. In key areas (light-switch, door handle, etc.) write a statement or question about a Belief/quote/teaching relevant to your exam paper/question. You could place sticky notes around your house to jog your memory in an exam. For example: there is a post it note above your light switch asking - What is the Sanctity of Life? What do the different Christians believe about Abortion? What is Salvation? Sanctity of life means Precious, holy and Sacred view of all human life.</li> </ul>
